Keynote address: Science, Reason and Religion



Speaker: Professor Keith Ward

Keith Ward is a philosopher, theologian and author. He is a former Regius Professor of Divinity at Oxford University, a Fellow of the British Academy and an ordained priest of the Church of England.

Reason as a measure of Faith and of Science



Speaker: Professor John Haldane

John Haldane is Professor of Philosophy and Director of the Centre for Ethics, Philosophy and Public Affairs at the University of St Andrews. He is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Edinburgh and Chairman of the Royal Institute of Philosophy. He is also an author, commentator and broadcaster and, by appointment of Pope Benedict XVI, is Consultor to the Pontifical Council for Culture.

Speaker: Professor Douglas Blackwood

Douglas Blackwood is Emeritus Professor of Psychiatric Genetics and Honorary Consultant Psychiatrist at the University of Edinburgh with long standing interest in how genes contribute to mental illnesses. He believes new genetic discoveries and insights widen the context for spirituality, its relation to religion and importance in psychiatry.

These questions and others like them will be tackled and explored in a series of highly stimulating and interesting talks and conversations.

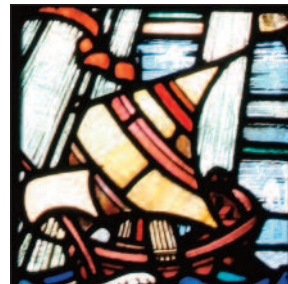

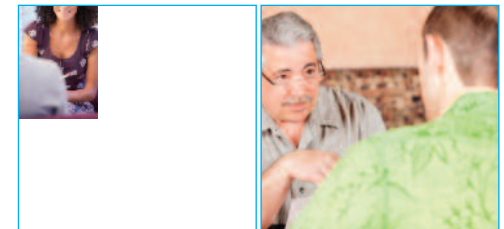
